Returning to Jerusalem

This month I'll be joining hundreds of other rabbis in Jerusalem and Tel Aviv for a rabbinical convention designed to engage rabbis in current issues and spiritual trends in Israel today. It's hard to imagine that it's been eight years since I've been to Israel, and I've been longing to go back ever since. Some of the most profound moments and time spent of my life was within Israel during a summer course abroad at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, and during the year that I lived there as a first-year rabbinical student at Hebrew Union College. Israel is my home away from home, a place that I always long to return to, no matter what's going on there, and no matter what political issues the country is facing. Upon landing in Ben Gurion airport, my lips always turn to utter words from the section of Psalms known as the "Songs of Ascent."



When YHWH returned us in our return to Zion, we were like dreamers. Our mouths were filled with laughter and our tongues with jubilation (Psalm 126:1-2)

What is it about Israel that ignites such a longing? It's the connection to my ancestors who walked the very stones that we walk on today. It's the sense that everyone around me, despite our differences, belongs to the tribe of the Jewish people. One grows roots in the soil of Israel without much trouble, because we are native to the land. This longing is my Zionism, and my connection to the people and land of Israel is unshakable.

I care about the security threats that Israel faces daily. I worry that the new government of Israel doesn't represent the values and democracy that I hold dear. I empathize with the plight and situation of the Palestinian people. Yet my heart beats to the rhythm of Hatikvah, the anthem of Israel that describes the longing of the Jewish soul for the land our people.

Our spring Semester is off to a great start! We have been performing bible story skits, singing hebrew prayers, creating art projects and cooking for our local shelter.


















JCOH MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

David Margolis & Georges Sylvestre



Building connections and nourishing existing relationships are essential to JCOH's continued vitality in the Hamptons. Always looking for opportunities to further connect our members, we are excited to introduce our Member Spotlight series that will highlight JCOH families by sharing their stories and insights.

When David and Georges met 17 years ago, they had more in common than most people meeting for the first time. "We met at Fire Island, and we were drawn to each other immediately," says Georges. They quickly learned that they both spoke several of the same languages, literally and figuratively. "Most importantly, French, which is my family's first language," says Georges. They also shared a love of travel, having respectively visited (and occasionally resided in) a few dozen countries. Georges, Frenchborn and raised in Québec, and David, raised in Switzerland, had both always wanted children. "Having (and wanting) children was not frequent among gay male couples at that time," says Georges, but having wooed David with his cooking skills and David he with his sense of humor, they started their journey towards fatherhood. "Thanks to two amazing surrogates, we were blessed with a family. Tristan was born in 2010 and three years later came Noah." They are now respectively 12 and nine and attend the Lycée Français of New York where they are taught in French and English. Tristan is presently getting ready for his Bar Mitzvah at the JCOH on May 20. Georges is an obstetrician specializing in high-risk pregnancies, David works in marketing.

David and Georges began coming out east in 2014, and a few years later made it a permanent haven of tranquility by buying a home in East Hampton. "We try to be here most weekends," says Georges. "Given that we divide our time between two locations, it was important for us to find a Jewish community that supported that lifestyle," he says. "The fact that the

Hebrew school was only on Sundays and not during the week was a big plus for us." However, what attracted them to the JCOH was more than just the Hebrew School and convenience of location. "In large part to the JCOH, we were able to easily integrate within the local community and have formed long-lasting bonds with numerous family members," says Georges. "The JCOH has been so welcoming to our family and the LGBTQ community overall. The programming here has enriched our lives by enabling us to partake in initiatives that help improve the lives of people not only within our community, but also further afield such as in Ukraine," he says. After having visited a few options, it quickly became clear that the JCOH was the right choice for them.

When asked about the people who inspire them, Georges examines Simone Veil. "From a French Jewish family in Nice, her family was sent to the death camps where she lost her brother and father," he says. "She survived the Holocaust, returned to France to study law, and became Minister of Justice, followed by Minister of Health in the 1960s and 70s. She fought for immigrant rights, women's rights and for the poor and is considered one of the most influential politicians of all time."

Shabbat is their favorite Jewish holiday, with understandably logical reasoning. "It comes once a week! It's also a time during which we don't feel guilty about doing something non-work related," says Georges. "It's a great time to catch our breath and regroup as a family." Their piece of advice for Jewish families in the area? "Don't miss Shabbat on the beach!"

Jewish History on Long Island: The Oldest Jewish Cemetery

The Jewish Historical Society of Long Island was established in 2021 to preserve and celebrate the Jewish history on Long Island in the state of New York. Documents recently donated to JHSLI have revealed new details regarding the origins and nearly 150 year history of the oldest existing physical reminder of Jewish communal life on Long Island. Thanks to a joint partnership between JHSLI and LIU Post these documents, including hundreds more ranging from 1870 to the 1950s can be found online. They are part of the Jacob Hartmann collection of documents that have recently been digitized and now can be shared with the public.

October 2, 1876

Four Jewish men living in different communities across Long Island join together to purchase a 250'x90' piece of land within the Breslau Cemetery in the village of Breslau (today Lindenhurst). They were Bernard Jonas, Morris Miller, Hermann Rosenstein and Simon Spitz. The purchase price for the land dedicated for Jewish burials was \$135.

September 12, 1887


Breslau Hebrew Cemetery Association is incorporated with the purpose of serving as the administrators for the cemetery grounds. Jacob Hartmann is president and Nathan Cohen is secretary with six trustees including Isaac Taylor, Jacob Rosenbergh, Michael Sacks, M. Friedman, Samuel Hartmann and Simeon Hartmann. The headquarters of the association is located in Amityville.

May 28, 1900

Bernard Jonas and his wife Regina transfer their 25% ownership of the Jewish cemetery land in Lindenhurst to the Breslau Hebrew Cemetery Association.

February 15, 1934

Breslau Hebrew Cemetery Association, with Ike Brower as president and Sam Simon as secretary, transfers ownership of the cemetery property to Lindenhurst Hebrew Congregation. Due to a synagogue merger in 2006 administration of the cemetery was assumed by Congregation Beth El in Massapequa following the closing of Lindenhurst Hebrew Congregation. Another merger in 2016 transferred ownership to Congregation Beth Ohr in Bellmore following the closure of Congregation Beth El. The cemetery is still active today.

Set on a nine-acre forest of lush trees, Shaarey Pardes Accabonac Grove Cemetery provides a beautiful and serene final resting place for members of the Jewish Center of the Hamptons and their families. The park-like, perfectly manicured surrounds are majestic and comforting, honoring those who have passed. Designed by renowned American architect Norman Jaffe in 1991, Shaarey Pardes is a place of ultimate peace, where the beauty of nature and memories are held eternal.
