

Spring is here! As the weather gets warmer and the days grow longer, our emerging season abounds with meaningful markings of Jewish time. First, on March 23rd and 24th, we will celebrate Purim. Purim reminds us that in the times of greatest hardship, the Jewish people have resisted tyranny and oppression, and have not only survived, but thrived.

After we celebrate our continuity, we turn our thoughts to themes of freedom and rebirth. As we prepare for the holiday of Passover, beginning April 22nd this year, we go through a process of ridding our homes and ourselves of chametz. While the most practical application of this process asks us to get rid of any food-stuff with leaven, I wanted to offer a different understanding on how we can engage with this tradition.

On Passover, as we clean our kitchens and our houses, we also take the time to symbolically clean ourselves. Chametz is a reactive agent. Think about it - it's what causes food to rise and get puffy. In cleansing ourselves of chametz, we rid ourselves of the things that make us personally puff up; things that irritate us, or make us swell with anger or ego.

The holiday of Passover is all about freedom. Each Seder, we re-tell the story of the Exodus, remembering how Pharaoh hardened his heart to the Israelites' cries for freedom. Passover is a chance for reflection, to transport ourselves mentally into the space of the enslaved. As we think about Pharaoh, the antagonistic leader who held the Israelites back from their freedom, we reflect on the elements in our own lives which hold us back from being the people who we want to be. What are those entities in our lives which cause us to harden our own hearts?

Just as the Israelites were freed from the enslavement of the chametz holding them back in Egypt, the literal chametz that was stalling their advancement in waiting for their bread to rise, and the figurative chametz of captivity, so too must we free ourselves from the enslavement of external forces of chametz which are holding us back.

As we take note of the chametz in our kitchens as we prepare our homes to usher in this holiday of Passover, a time of renewal and new beginnings, may we also note the chametz existing in the world around us, holding others back. And just as Moses freed the Israelite people from Pharoah, may we spread the message of freedom and hope to those in the world around us.

As we move into this holiday and the seders that we will attend, may we each leave behind the chametz that we would like to cast away: the things that weigh us down and stop us from being as free and fulfilled as possible.

Wishing us all a Passover liberated from our personal chametz.



Our New Home

Much renovation was in order to serve the needs of our growing congregation. The 4 key families that had remained in the Sag Harbor temple now joined us and were welcomed with open arms. Other families that were new to East Hampton also joined and quickly involved themselves and their children in the Temple's activities. Some of them were Sol and Roz Richer from Montauk, Sy and Ethel Schutz from East Hampton, Maury and Lynn Kouffman from East Hampton, and Al and Jen Rattiner from Montauk.

The parlor of 44 Woods Lane was transformed into our Sanctuary, thanks to the diligent and untiring efforts of Catherine and James Perkins, owners of Perkins Gallery in Amagansett. The Ten Commandments so beautifully etched on the doors of the Holy Ark was done by our own local artist, Sholom Farber, who, with his wife Shirley and their 4 children, also joined the Temple.

Three bedrooms on the second floor were converted to classrooms. Through the efforts of Frank Brill, a school board member, we purchased 50 used school chairs from the Westhampton School District for \$2.00 each. Frank Brill, Bob Brill, Irv Markowitz and I picked them up and trucked them to East Hampton and lugged them up to the classrooms. We purchased new blackboards, school supplies, and textbooks.



The George P. Camman house was acquired by Evan Frankel for the Jewish Center of the Hamptons in 1959. George A. Eldredge, builder, 1899; 1915 alterations.

Charlotte Markowitz was the Director of the Sunday School. I taught Bar and Bat Mitzvah and courses for teenagers. Charlotte and Danny Duberman taught all other children in our religious school. None of the teachers were paid a salary. The dining room in the house became our Boardroom and a fourth bedroom became the office. The third floor was reserved for use by any guest rabbi that the UAHC sent during the summer months. I continued to conduct Friday night services for two years until our engagement of Rabbi Albert Friedlander in 1961.

FOUNDING RABBI ALBERT FRIEDLANDER: 1961-66

Rabbi Albert Friedlander

founding Rabbi 1961-66

Career

In 1961, after serving as Rabbi for five years at Reform Synagogue Temple B'nai B'rith, Rabbi Friedlander accepted the position as Founding Rabbi of the Jewish Center of the Hamptons. During this time, he also advised Jewish students at his alma mater. Columbia University, where he had obtained his Ph.D. in theology. He also became very involved in the fight for civil rights, taking his students down to Memphis to march with Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. In 1966, he moved with his family to London, to become the Rabbi of Wembley Liberal Synagogue, and teach at the Leo Baeck College. In 1971 he was invited to follow Rabbi Harold Reinhart and serve the Westminster Synagogue in Knightsbridge, London. He remained there until his retirement, upon which he was created Rabbi Emeritus. In 1993 he was awarded the Bundesverdienstkreuz First Class (the Order of Merit) from the German government and in 2001 he became the first overseas-born Rabbi to be awarded an OBE.

From 1975 to 1995 he was the Vice President for the World Union for Progressive Judaism. He was chairman of the British branch of the World Conference of Religions for Peace (1990–94), committed to the Three Faiths Forum, and a president of the Council of Christians and Jews. He was also a lecturer at the Leo Baeck College from 1967 to 1971,



before becoming Director of Studies from 1971 to 1982 and then Dean from 1982 to 2004. Friedlander was involved in many interfaith dialogues, both nationally and internationally. He spent a particular amount of time in the land of his birth, as a guest professor at many German universities, as a speaker and teacher at the Evangelischen Kirchentage and Katholikentage; and appeared regularly in various German media.

Personal life

In 1961, he married Evelyn Friedlander and had three children: Ariel (who also became a rabbi), Michal, and Noam. Albert died in 2004 and his wife, Evelyn, died in October in 2019. His sister, Dorrit Friedlander, died 11 years after his death.





Yom Kippur, we've always found it extremely moving between the focus on atoning and resetting for the coming year and the music that commences the holiday, starting with Kol Nidre services and culminating with Neliah.

Who inspires you, and why?

Dan's maternal and Rachel's paternal grandmothers inspire us. Both Naomi and Dorothy were extremely strong and capable women, widowed for lengthy periods of time, who served as the matriarch of their families. Both lived into their late 90s and were able to spend time with Eliana and Marin and pass on family stories and traditions through the generations.
