Shabbat Shira, The Sabbath of Song:

In a few weeks, we will once again hear the beautiful shir melody, as we recount the exodus from Egypt, in the Shirat Ha'yam, the song of the sea.

One of the verses that I have been singing since October seventh, as a verse of comfort, is from the Shir Melody:

עָזָי וְזִמְרַתֹ יָּה וְדֶתִי־לֵי לִישׁוּעֶה זֶה אֵלִי וְאַנְוֹהוּ אֱלֹהֵי אָבִי וַאֲרֹמֶמֶדָהוּ: (ב)

The Eternal is my strength and might; God has become my deliverance. This is my God, and I will cherish Him; The God of my father, and I will exalt Him.

This verse, or rather the first part of it: The Eternal is my strength and might, God has become my deliverance, appears in Psalm 118 and again in the book of Isaiah. I think that perhaps that is why I have been singing it for so many months. When tragedy strikes, either in a community, or in a family, we look for strength. I consider myself blessed that I have a strong belief in God, that I can call upon God for such strength.

It's been months, and we have seen no resolution to the war in Israel. It's been months, prayer rallies have come and gone, tee shirts have been sold, necklaces and bracelets remembering the kidnapped have been sold. Young Israelis have been called up to serve, reservists have been called back, and still no resolution. I still fear the future, and I still question how this happened. I, like many of you, feel antisemitism in this country is powerful and profound. Yet, I continue to sing: Azi v'zimrat Yah, Vay'hi Li Lishuah. The Eternal is my strength and might; God has become my deliverance.

I encourage all of you to take a moment and discover where your strength lies in your beliefs. I encourage each of you to continue to keep your energies working to end antisemitism on our campuses and in our country. Continue to be a voice for the State of Israel and continue to pray to our God for the strength of all those who suffer.

I hope soon to be able to lift a timbrel in my hand, as did our prophet, Miriam, and invite all of you to dance with me as we sing a song of victory.

Dear Friends,

Happy secular new year! What a joy and privilege to join JCOH for shabbatot these next three months. I so look forward to learning with you, praying, lifting our voices in sacred song, and celebrating the richness and beauty of Jewish tradition together. Judaism provides innumerable possibilities to contemplate time as it unfolds. In our secular new year of 2024, may we seize the opportunities, be they daily, weekly, monthly or even yearly to reflect on our lives as they have past, and set intentions to bring us blessings in the future.

Title: Where Are You? Finding Yourself in the Bible

In the timeless tale of Adam and Eve's pivotal moment in the Garden of Eden, an age-old question arises: "Where are you?" Location doesn't even begin to answer the question. It's not about "where are you in the world?," but rather "where are you in your world?" The former poses an inquiry about geography, and the latter about your emotional and spiritual state of mind. God cares little about tracking us and pinpointing our physical location. God cares rather about what our hearts feel and experience.

This book ventures beyond the map of geography to chart the locations within the Bible as metaphysical states of being. The Bible chronicles the experiences of life that we find reflected in our own lives. The Garden of Eden is not a long lost paradise, but a state of mind we glimpse at moments of life. To dwell in Haran (*crossroads*) is not about living in the modern region of Southwest Turkey, but about being stuck at a transition point, unable to move forward. Going down to Egypt is not about visiting the pyramids, but it's where we enter the deep dark recesses of spiritual and emotional depression. As each of these places are explored, you'll discover not only the metaphysical meanings behind the places of the Bible, but we'll see the reflections of ourselves through the biblical landscape. Join this trans-formative journey of unraveling the timeless wisdom of the Bible, and rediscover yourself in its sacred stories.



Help to answer the call to feed the hungry during this time.




LET'S DINE TOGETHER! WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 24 6:30PM
